

Count 4: SELL/POSSESS/USE/TRANSPORT MACHINE GUN

The above-named defendant on or about Wednesday, April 29, 2026, at 551 Southtowne Place, Apt S201, in the City of South Milwaukee, Milwaukee County, Wisconsin, did possess a fully automatic firearm, contrary to sec. 941.26(1g)(a) and (2)(a), 939.50(3)(h) Wis. Stats.

Upon conviction for this offense, a Class H Felony, the defendant may be fined not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), or imprisoned not more than six (6) years, or both.

Probable Cause:

Complainant is a law enforcement officer employed by the Milwaukee Police Department. Complainant bases this complaint on information and belief and on official police reports prepared by himself and fellow police officers which are of the kind Complainant has used in the past and found to be truthful and reliable and which Complainant knows are prepared in the ordinary and regular course of police business. Said reports reflect:

BACKGROUND

1. Since approximately April, 2023, Milwaukee Police have been investigating a rising trend of “Street Takeovers” in Southeastern Wisconsin. These events, or “sideshow”, generally involve multiple vehicles, often high performance and decorated or themed, engaging in extremely reckless driving in a small area surrounded by pedestrian onlookers. At these events, spectators form a circle, blocking the entire intersection to traffic. The drivers perform high risk maneuvers such as donuts, burnouts, drifting and sliding, coming within inches of those watching. The spectators for these Street Takeovers can number in the 100’s and are volatile and unpredictable in nature. They often involve illegal fireworks, bonfire in the street and individuals who participate and attend have been known to possess firearms or have stolen parts on their vehicles.
2. These events pose substantial risk to the spectators and participants, but also to the public, property and first responders who are called to clear the chaos and have been attacked in the past. Unlike street racing, where the focus is on competition, Street Takeovers are about exhibition of driving ‘skills’ and showing off for the multiple cameras and cell phones recording the behavior. The riskier the maneuver, the better. Almost immediately following a takeover, a flood of videos, including some dramatic compilations set to music, surface on social media platforms, documenting the criminal behavior.

AS TO COUNT #1-#3:

3. Between April 25, 2026, at approximately 11pm through 3am on April 26, 2026, there were approximately twenty calls for service for the Milwaukee Police for 'street takeovers' in numerous areas of the city. The participants in these events moved around frequently throughout the night, making it difficult to try to catch up with them. As soon as they dispersed from one location they appeared at another. Within hours of these incidents, numerous videos appeared on open source social media. Multiple videos from that night show the same cars and at least two costumed characters (an inflatable Sponge Bob and an individual in an orange jumpsuit and mask) at different locations throughout Milwaukee.
4. Many of the videos from the April 25-26, 2026 Street Takeovers include a white Dodge Charger with a large Pink Panther holding drinks wrap on the side of the car. Along the bottom, in pink writing are the words, "SRT.RICK414". The car has Montana license plates which also bears, "SRTRICK". This vehicle is registered to SRT Rick, LLC, with Ricky Alcantara-Hernandez listed as the "executive". It has also been determined that Ricky Alcantara-Hernandez uses the Instagram account of "srt.rick414" and this page features his two vehicles, the white Dodge Charger and a black Chrysler 300, and countless Street Takeover videos from the past few years, including the night charged.
5. One of the locations depicted on the videos from April 25-26, 2026, was 9100 West Mill Road, City and County of Milwaukee. Officers were dispatched to that location for a "shots fired" call and a report of vehicles in the intersection doing 'spins'. Another call reported hearing twelve gunshots and fireworks being set off. Approximately 200 vehicles were reported in the area. Milwaukee Police squads arrived and observed vehicles and spectators fleeing the area. At one point someone discharged fireworks at the responding police cars.
6. There are numerous posted videos from this location and review is on-going, however an Instagram user, for reference IG User #1, captured video of Alcantara-Hernandez participating in the extremely dangerous driving, sliding/drifted sideways in the circle of several people, putting them at risk for death or great bodily harm. Another user, for reference, IG User #2, posted a photo of Alcantara-Hernandez's car driving in the center of the crowd at that location as well.
7. Further investigation revealed that many of these takeovers on the North Side of Milwaukee begin in the intersection of North 87th Street and West Tower Road, City and County of

Milwaukee. Officers were able to identify the location in additional video from the night of April 25th, into the 26th, 2026, posted by Instagram user referenced here as IG User #3. A highlight reel entitled “Mke (with a house emoji) posted on April 26, 2026, shows a video of Alcantara-Hernandez’s white Charger with the Pink Panther wrap driving fast and recklessly in a tight circle and skidding/drifted around several individuals who are recording the action on their phones. A second white Charger joins him in circling and skidding out, making it even more dangerous for everyone involved. The cars often come within a foot, if not inches, from the spectators, endangering their lives and safety. The video clip is labelled on the screen as “Good white chargers (two heart eye emojis) and underneath that is written, “@srt.rick414”. A large number of spectators are also standing around the outside of the circle. Some individuals, including the Sponge Bob character and the person in the jumpsuit and mask can be seen running towards the car. Video of this same incident from a slightly different angle is also posted by Instagram user for reference, IG User #4, in a compilation of the events of that night.

8. The front seat passenger in Alcantara-Hernandez’s car is holding an unknown black object out the window with an orange end that resembled an AR style gun, a toy gun or possibly some type of camera on a holder. The driver is visible as the car drives right past the camera on at least three occasions. The male driver is recognizable as Ricky Alcantara-Hernandez, based upon the shape of his face and the black Meta AI glasses he is wearing. Alcantara-Hernandez was arrested wearing those same glasses on April 29, 2026, and a warrant for their content is forthcoming. This portion of the Street Takeover occurred at 8700 West Tower Road, City and County of Milwaukee.
9. There are numerous other videos featuring Alcantara-Hernandez’s car from that night, including several videos from the Bayview area of the City of Milwaukee at the intersection of South Kinnickinnic Ave and West Lincoln Ave, around 11:45pm on April 25, 2026. On a video posted by IG User #5, for reference, the Charger can be seen speeding into the intersection with two other cars, all doing circles around approximately twenty young individuals standing in the middle of the road. Each car slides sideways as it turns, coming dangerously close the spectators on the sides, before the three cars drive off together northbound.
10. It should be noted that there appear to be only five or six cars participating in the dangerous driving during the incidents from the night of April 25-26, 2026, including the defendant’s Pink

Panther Charger. The crowd and the participants move locations which include North 87th and West Towers Road, North 91st Street and Mill Road and South Kinnickinnic Ave and West Lincoln Ave in the Bayview area. This group also travelled to North Port Washington Road and West Silver Spring Road in Glendale and into the downtown area of Milwaukee that night as well and investigation continues into those locations. Videos from the different locations reveal that fires were set in the roadways and fireworks discharged into the air. Gunfire was also reported by concerned citizens in the area of 9100 West Mill Road.

11. On the night of April 25-26, 2026, Ricky Alcantara-Hernandez endangered the lives and safety of his passenger, the public and the hundreds of spectators who lined the streets at the above locations to watch as he engaged in this extremely reckless and potentially life threatening behavior. Following the Street Takeovers, on April 26, 2026, the defendant posted on his Instagram page, "*Any good videos of me from this weekend send them my way*" followed by a yellow smile emoji. Below the text was a picture of a red key fob with "SRT" and a red "Hellcat" logo key chain. The defendant's Instagram page contains the above mentioned videos where he was tagged by those Instagram users.

AS TO COUNT #4:

12. On April 29, 2026, Milwaukee Police executed a search warrant on Ricky Alcantara-Hernandez's residence at 551 Southtowne Place, Apartment #S201, City of South Milwaukee, Milwaukee County. Just prior to serving the warrant, the defendant exited the apartment and began driving away in his black Chrysler 300. He was stopped and arrested for his active suspect alert for the above incidents. In a search incident to arrest, he was found to be in possession of two iPhones, a pair of Meta AI glasses that are visible in the videos from the takeovers and a pink Glock 43 semi-automatic handgun, loaded with eight unfired rounds in a black cloth holster.
13. During the search of the apartment officers located six more phones, including four iPhones and two Nokia cellphones. Two Autel vehicle key programmer tablets, commonly used to steal cars when not in the possession of a locksmith or a legitimate repair shop or car dealership, were located in the kitchen area, along with the red SRT key fob with the Hellcat keychain as depicted

- on the defendant's Instagram account. Also in the kitchen was a Insta 360 camera stick and nine brass Smith & Wesson unfired .40 caliber cartridges along with miscellaneous keys and key fobs.
14. Located in the bedroom of Alcantara-Hernandez's brother, MAC, were six guns: a white and black FMK 5.56 AR pistol with a loaded magazine, a black Ruger .22 caliber 10/22 rifle, a black 12-guage Mossberg shotgun, a black 9mm Freedom Reigns AR-9 semi-automatic pistol with an empty magazine, a *fully automatic PSA Multi Cal AR pistol* and a *fully automatic pink Spikes Tactical Multi-Cal AR pistol*. Two additional rifle receivers and a pink upper receiver, along with 28 unfired .25 caliber rounds were also recovered.
15. In the bedroom of Ricky Alcantara-Hernandez, officer located two more guns, including a black AR pistol with a casing collector and a black 9mm Glock 19. There were miscellaneous vehicle titles, a black Dodge key fob and a white Visa card in the defendant's name, as well as a black credit card scanner. Two GoPro cameras, a pocket 3 and a black 360, and a Hoenagager gaming computer were also recovered. An additional 14 unfired .25 caliber rounds were also in the room.
16. The guns were processed and Ricky Alcantara-Hernandez's fingerprints were positively identified on two of the guns recovered from his brother's room - the FMK AR-1 semi-automatic pistol and the *fully automatic pink Spikes Tactical Multi-Cal AR pistol*.
17. The investigation into all of these matters in ongoing and additional charges are likely.
